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Learn about lawn bowling Saturday


Open house, demonstration at Hillside

The Walnut Creek Planning Commission looked over the plans for the Rossmoor Shopping Center in a public meeting Feb. 25. Center developer/ owner Terrence Tallen, CEO of Tallen Capital Partners, LLC, called the review a "very detailed vetting and evaluation" and said the comments were predominantly positive.
